

The postal service as we have been experiencing is expecting more and more productivity with fewer and fewer human resources. Many clerks live in the state of perpetual overtime while others due to faulty Function Four (F4) studies are being starved. Management's argument of using earned hours as opposed to actual hours is creating hardships across Texas that we must continue to file grievances.

Where Texas was once a leader amongst other states in Committee on Political Actions (COPA) donations the trend has reversed in we have fallen suddenly in recent years. Our COPA uses our contributions to help support and elect legislators who support postal workers and labor as a whole. When Former National President Bill Burris initially called on all postal workers to contribute to COPA, he asked each postal worker to contribute a weekly amount that equaled the cost of a postage stamp for a collective goal of 1 million dollars. This was before citizens freed opened the flood gates of dark money coming from wealthy special interest groups and individuals.







September 10 – 15, 2019 Ballots will be mailed on or after date, how-




September 19, 2019 is the deadline to request a duplicate ballot.

MISSION STATEMENT

Nearly 28 percent of U.S. households (or 100 million people) do not have access to affordable financial services. For many, traditional banks are out of reach either geographically (bank deserts exist in both rural and urban areas), or due to high fees and other obstacles to opening, maintaining and accessing accounts. This lack of access drives millions (mainly the working poor) to rely on costly, predatory services such as check cashing

and payday loans, trapping many in a cycle of debt.

The United States Postal Service (USPS) is in a unique position to provide basic, affordable, consumer-driven financial services via its existing infrastructure. The USPS is a trusted, accessible, and secure government agency (that receives no tax dollars for operating expenses) with the world's largest retail network (31,000 branches serving every urban, suburban, and rural community in the country). Non-profit financial services provided by the USPS could help struggling families nationwide achieve financial stability - and strengthen the USPS mission to serve the public.

Postal systems around the world including France, Italy, Japan, China,

Brazil, India, and New Zealand - offer financial services and play important roles in advancing financial inclusion and literacy. And we have a tradition of postal banking in the United States as well. From 1911 to 1967, the U.S. Post Office offered savings deposit accounts,

for example. The USPS continues to offer domestic and international money orders as well as international wire transfers.

Campaign for Postal Banking is a coalition of consumer, worker, financial reform, economic justice, community, civic, and faith-based organizations building a campaign-based movement to inform and mobilize the public to call on the United States Postal Service to take the necessary steps to restore and expand postal banking at its branches across the country.

Legislative News Flash

Five Congressional Republicans of our Great State of Texas Rep. Will Hurd, Rep. Bill Flores, Rep. Mike Conway, Rep. Pete Olson and Rep. Kenny Marchant have made official announcements to their constituents of their intentions to not seek re-election in 2020.

This gives the AFL- CIO, Texas Postal Workers Union and other

Unions throughout the State of Texas an opportunity to elect Candidates in these districts who would best serve their interests when it comes to employees right to safe work environments, good paying jobs and benefits. We need to elect Candidates who will best serve the unions right

to organize and demand decent wages and Medical care that is affordable to everyone.

Rep. Will Hurd of the 23 District of Texas, the only black Republican in the House, won't seek re-election in 2020. Hurd represents a sprawling West Texas battleground district that includes one -third of the U.S. border with Mexico and has flipped between Democrats and Republicans several times in the past two decades. Will Hurd won two close races for re-election after winning the seat, defeating Democratic opponents by 1.3 points in 2016 even as Trump lost the district. And them by less than half a percentage point in 2018, when he survived the Democratic wave that flipped the House.

GOP Rep. Bill Flores of the 17 District of Texas announced his plans to retire from Congress at the end of his term thus becoming the fifth Texas Republican to do so this election cycle. Flores won his first election in 2010 by defeating a Democrat during President Barack Obama's first midterm election

and rose to become a chairman of the conservative Republican Study Committee. While Flores' district between Dallas and Austin is now reliably Republican, Democrats have centered their efforts to expand their House majority by picking up several other seats in the suburbs of the Lone Star state. President Donald Trump helped Flores' district in 2016 with 56% of the vote.

Rep. Mike Conway of the 11 District of Texas will also not seek re-elec-

Republican for decades and was once represented by former House Majority Leader Tom DeLay, Democrats have made inroads in recent years, and the race could shape up to be one of the most spirited House battles in the country next year.

Rep. Kenny Marchant announced he will not seek re-election next year, adding another member to the rapidly growing House GOP retirement list and opening a newly competi-

tion in 2020, according to GOP sources who have been expecting him to retire although his office declined to comment. Conway has served in Congress for 15 years but stepped into the national spotlight in 2017 when he was tasked with leading the House Intelligence Committee's probe into Russian interference in the 2016 election. The panel's then - chairman, Rep. Devin Nunes (R- Calif.), had agreed to step aside from the investigation amid ethics charges against him.to multiple GOP sources, Conway's congressional exit is just the latest in a string of GOP retirements, which come as Republicans are the House minority for the first time in eight years.

Rep. Pete Olson (R-Texas) of the 22nd District of Texas announced that he also has chosen not to seek re-election in 2020, thus opening up a potential battleground district in the Houston suburbs. Olson, who was first elected in 2008, said he was leaving the seat to spend more time with his family. While the district has been solidly

tive Dallas - area seat. "It is time for me to announce that I will not seek another term as congressman from the 24th District of Texas," Marchant said in a statement. "I am looking forward to finishing out my term and then returning to Texas to start a new chapter." Marchant's seat is a top target for the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, which plans to invest in flipping a slate of Texas seats occupied by Republicans that have rapidly shifted to the left in recent years. Marchant won re-election last year by only 3 percentage points against a Democratic candidate who spent only \$96,000 for the entire cycle.

Brothers and Sisters, we have an opportunity to elect five Candidates to Congress from the state of Texas who will support our right to fight for better wages, and benefits. We have an opportunity to elect candidates who will support Unions, affordable health care and affordable education for all.

on June 1, 2014, and she is currently serving her second four-year term. Sara



became a United Airlines Flight Attendant in 1996 and has been a union activist since nearly the beginning of her flying career, including serving as strike chair and leading communications for nearly 10 years at AFA's United chapter. Sara is passionate about AFA's continued mission to achieve fair compensation, job security, and improved quality of life for aviation's first responders as well as a safe, healthy and secure aircraft cabin for passengers and crew alike. She believes Flight Attendants can play a pivotal role in strengthening the Labor Movement with more public contact than almost any other job and access to every corner of the earth.

KOOPER CARAWAY President - Sioux Falls AFL-CIO

Kooper Caraway comes from a working-class family in Texas. His Mother was a retail worker and his Fa-



ther worked in the Trucking Industry. Many of his Cousins and his Grandfather were Union Steelworkers in Lonestar, TX. He began organizing in High School. When Immigration Agents, under the direction of the Bush Administration, set up camp and began raiding people's homes in the small town of Mt. Pleasant, TX Kooper Caraway, then a High School Junior, organized a series of actions and demonstrations until the Federal Agents packed up and left town. He then went to work in Dallas for the Labor Movement. As an organizer with Jobs with Justice he was successful at bridging the Community-Labor Gap. He has since served as a Union Rep for the American Federation of Teachers and an Organizer for the United Food and Commercial Workers Union. In 2017 he relocated to South Dakota to serve as Lead Organizer for AFSCME Council 65 and on Jan 3rd, 2018 he was elected President of the Sioux Falls AFL-CIO. At 27, he became the Youngest CLC President in the Nation.

MARK DIMONDSTEIN President - American Postal Workers Union

Mark Dimondstein is President of the American Postal Workers Union, which rep-



resents more than 200,000 employees of the U.S. Postal Service and approximately 1,500 employees in the private-sector mailing industry. He began his first three-year term in November 2013 and was re-elected on October 5, 2016 for another term starting in November 2016. Since taking office, Dimondstein has transformed the APWU into a fighting, activist organization. He helped establish A Grand Alliance to Save Our Public Postal Service, strengthened the unity among the four postal unions, helped forge the



Campaign for Postal Banking, and led the successful fight against a privatization scheme involving the office-supply chain, Staples.

CHERYL ELIANO National Vice President AFGE District 10

Cheryl Eliano is the National Vice President of the American Federation of Government Employees in District 10, having assumed that post in

2014. Eliano's mission for District 10 is to provide exceptional leadership and service at all levels and locations within Texas,



New Mexico, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Panama. When federal employees were shut out of their jobs – or forced to work without paychecks – late last year, Cheryl helped place the general public squarely on the side of federal workers. The bruising battle to get federal employees back on the job and our government reopened lasted an outrageous 35 days.
